A Letter to the 6th

In one of those unique events that happened just before the reunion took place, Major Knight of the Ball High School JROTC program and Capt Joseph Santos of the Tinian JR/SR High School JROTC battalion were communicating about Hurricane Harvey. When Capt Santos found out that the Ball High cadets were going to support the 6th Bomb Group Reunion and that the 6th had been based on Tinian, he wrote the following letter. It is a moving and very personal tribute to the legacy of the veterans in the group.

“Major Knight,

On the chance that we do not communicate prior to your ceremony with the WWII Veterans, please relay the following to them:

Because of your service you liberated the Mariana Islands from a hostile, evil occupation. You liberated us from an army that would bayonet you or cut your head off with a Samauri sword for not bowing properly. BTW the Northern Mariana islands celebrate their “Liberation Day” every July 4th and Guam celebrates its “Liberation Day” every July 21st.

Because of your service it gave the Mariana Islands an opportunity to thrive after World War II.

Because of your service it gave my parents a chance to meet, marry, and raise 6 children in peace.

Because of your service my wife’s parents met, married and raised 8 children in peace.

Because of your service I had the opportunity to enlist and become an Army Officer in the greatest country in the world and retire from the greatest Army in the world.

Because of your service I met and married my wife, have two beautiful children and have a grandson and one on the way.

Because of your service I am afforded the opportunity to teach students the sacrifices you have made. To appreciate the freedoms you all fought for. To respect the flag and the country that the flag represents.

Because of your service the world is a much better place, although the evil that has happened in Las Vegas, NY and there in Texas reminds us that we must remain forever vigilant

I thank you for all you have done for our country and most especially for how you all have directly influenced my life.

For that I remain eternally grateful. God Bless You All and God Bless America!!!”

STAFF SERGEANT MARTY EICHELMAN INTERVIEWED

SSgt Marty Eichelman of Baltimore, MD enlisted in the US Army in September 1943 and did basic training at Greensboro, NC. He subsequently began pilot training at Shaw Field SC in an AT6, but the Army had other plans for him. There was a need for aerial gunners, so SSgt Eichelman was reassigned to aerial gunnery school at Buckingham Field in Fort Meyers, Florida. After completion of the school he was assigned to Grand Island, Nebraska in the newly formed 6th Bomb Group and the B-29 aircraft.

He moved to Tinian with the Group and flew as a right gunner on “Our Lady”.

His second mission was Operation Meetinghouse, the first night incendiary raid over Tokyo and one of the deadliest missions of the war. In all he and his crew flew on 35 missions — 23 of them with the 6th and the rest with the 504th Bomb Group. His 19th mission was the scariest as the aircraft was damaged during the mission, and the bomb bay doors failed to close. Not only that but two engines failed and they were flying on fumes when they made an emergency landing on Iwo Jima. Marty flew his last mission on August 6, 1945.

Marty tells a funny story about how the porch on his crew’s assigned “hooch” was made. There was a secured area on Tinian that housed a special mission aircraft (the 509th), but he had a friend who had access and who seemed to know where a supply of useable lumber was being kept. With a little GI ingenuity, that lumber was “borrowed” from the secure area and moved to a “more suitable location” in front of his living quarters.

Marty had four brothers who also served in the military during World War II in the US Army, the Army Air Forces, the Navy, and Coast Guard. Fortunately, they all returned home and went on to successful and productive lives. Marty came home and married Jeanne in 1951. They have been together for over 66 years and have three children. In November 2014 he took part in an Honor Flight to Washington DC where he was able to see the WWII Memorial. Thinking back on the war years, Marty feels fortunate to have served with some great ‘fellas’. Not a one of them was necessarily special, but they looked out for each other and did their duty.

6TH BOMB GROUP VETERAN BERNARD WILSON HONORED

BY FLORIDA VETERANS' HALL OF FAME

In 2013 the State of Florida established the Hall of Fame to recognize and honor veterans who, through their works and lives during or after military service, made a significant contribution to the state.

Bernard Wilson, father of David Wilson, was selected this year over twenty-nine other candidates. In David's words, "We are extremely proud of my father." He was part of crew #2404 R and served as a Left Blister Gunner under Lt. John Howett. Like many of The Greatest Generation's experiences during WWII defined him for the remainder of his life. This honor entails primarily the things he accomplished after WWII."

Bernard Wilson passed away in 2009. He was a humble man who quietly accomplished much in his lifetime. David feels like he would be uncomfortable with this attention, but he would be proud and make sure to share credit with those men of his crew and the 6thBG. The events that he was most proud of were flying in the longest bombing mission of the war (his crew flew on the mission but had to abort), flying the last mission of the war, and flying over the USS Missouri on 2 September 1945 as the Instruments of Surrender were signed. Perhaps, many of our readers also remember these events, too.

Some but not all of Bernard's civic/veteran related activities included:

- Being active in American Legion for 64 years and Commander of three American Legion Posts. Active in VFW for 64 years, active in Rotary, and his church.
- Had a monument erected to those Madison County citizens who made the ultimate sacrifice.
- Served as Veterans' Service Officer for Madison County for 23 years.

Wilson will join other exceptional inductees in the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame. Several were previous governors, state and federal representatives, and General Officers.

Steve was on the board of directors of the Sixth Bomb Group. He died on Sept 28, 2017 in Nashville, TN. Steve was the co-founder of Gobbell Hays Partners, and was an International expert on indoor air quality and asbestos abatement. He is survived by a daughter, Diana Hays, and a sister, Connie Richardson.

Mary E. Gake, 92, passed away on Oct. 30, 2016, in Lincoln NE. She was a Graduate of Wheaton College, a member of Christian Business and Professional Women's Association and an Associate member of Telephone Pioneers. Retired from Nebraska State Historical Society. She was married for more than 69 years to Wallace Gake, an aircraft radar maintenance technician with the 40th B.S. 6th B.G.



Richard "Dick" Randall died on October 3, 2017 in Dunlap, Iowa. He was 94 years old. Dick served his country for over 26 years as a bombardier and navigator during WWII, Korea and Vietnam. Mr. Randall was very active in his community and church and was the president of the Dunlap Savings Bank at the time of his retirement. He loved to sing. He was preceded in death by his two wives and an infant son and is survived by four children.
