WHAT THE SIXTH MEANS TO ME

In broadening the scope of this column to include not only Veterans, but also spouses, and children, I am writing as the daughter of Captain Ralph C. Wilson, Airplane Commander/Pilot of "The White Mistress", B-29-50-BW, serial number 42-24776 in the $40^{\rm th}$ Squadron.

The Sixth is many things to me, and they are all wonderful treasures I have acquired since attending my first reunion in Midland, Texas in 2008. Thank heavens for Phil Crowther's website where I found the Sixth and for David Wilson for the information he has so generously shared at the reunions! At the top of the treasure list is "A Dad Fix". That is a term coined by another Associate Member I heard 4 years ago in Portland and can relate to completely.

When I am around the Veterans, their personalities, sense of humor, strong moral code, sense of duty, devotion to family, and patriotism, they all remind me of my parents. No wonder they are called "The Greatest Generation".

At the reunions I have met Veterans who knew my Dad and even my Mother at Grand Island. I have learned how my folks were similar yet different from some of the others, too. They were married in March 1943, and Dad was 29 when he went

to combat. His crew called him "The Old Man" since most of them were 19, 20, and 21. When Dad left for Tinian, I was six weeks old! About that time I came down with pneumonia. It must have been pretty scary for both of them – combat and a new baby!! And a sick one at that.

I count as treasures the Veterans, spouses, children, and grandchildren who have become our friends over the years. From them I have learned so much about the Veterans and their sacrifices, the importance of Tinian, the B-29 and its missions, and, of course, what was happening at home and around the world during WW2. The stories they tell are personal and real. Unlike some other Dads, mine did talk about the war (especially after a couple of drinks) but not these same stories.

I do wish that my parents had lived long enough to enjoy some of the Sixth Bomb Group Reunions, too. Dad passed away in 1970, 14 years before the first reunion, and my Mom in 1975. They would have enjoyed all of it!

THE GRAND ISLAND PROPELLOR MONUMENT: A CONDENSED STORY

Note: this story is a condensed version of the original written by Virgil Morgan.

For several years the Sixth Bomb Group Association Board had discussed holding a reunion in Grand Island, Nebraska, and installing some type of memorial commemorating the time the Group spent training there and expressing thanks to the people of Grand island for their hospitality. At the 1992 reunion the Board decided to proceed with a memorial to be located at the Grand Island Veterans' Memorial Park. And so, began the saga of the Grand Island Propeller Monument.

Ed Allgor suggested the Group erect a propeller and submitted a drawing of his proposal. A decision was made that October, 1993 would be the date of the reunion and the dedication of the propeller monument. A target date was set, but the challenge of finding a real B-29 propeller was more complicated than anyone thought.

There were dozens of phone calls made to museums, scrap yards, and museums. A hub was found here, pieces found there, payments made for phantom propellers that really didn't exist and had to be refunded. According to Virgil, "Finally, we found, we thought, the very blades we had been searching for and in June 1993. They were delivered to Seattle only to find out they were propeller blades for a Super Constellation and not a B-29. Both aircraft used the same engine, but the blades were different." So, Virgil was now the proud owner of the propeller blades for a Constellation engine and various parts for a B-29 engine. The clock was ticking way too fast as the October reunion was approaching as was the promised dedication of a monument in the city of Grand Island.

Virgil Morgan made a call to the San Antonio Propeller Service who, possibly with some divine intervention, found suitable B-29 blades from a source in Arizona, had them shipped to San Antonio and on to Seattle. It was August 1993 now, and the clock was ticking faster.

Finally, the propeller began to take shape in the Morgan #04 building in Everett, WA. It soon became apparent that the handling of this monster was not going to be easy in Grand Island without special life equipment or support stands so these were also fabricated in the Morgan shops. The assembled propeller was 16 feet 7 inches in diameter and had to be taken apart for shipment to Grand Island. Boeing came through and did the final finishing and plating, and we copied the original stenciling on the blades to insure they had their exact original

markings. We were able to trade four 6th BG patches for four authentic WWII blade decals to add to the authenticity of the blades. We recognized that the blades on a B-29 tilt slightly upward at an 86-degree angle. We were able to manufacture the supporting structure to allow for the authentic angle. On October 1st, work in Everett was done and everything was disassembled and shipped to Grand Island. The project was almost on time if not exactly on budget.

Ruhe Construction in Grand Island was a huge help with the installation as they constructed the monument base and did much of the work necessary to complete final installation. Without the Ruhe's and the cooperation of Grand Island Public Utilities, we would have had a really difficult time getting the project completed.

The monument was complete, the dedication was a success, the Veterans' Park contains a monument to the Sixth and a permanent symbol of the Group and their time in Grand Island.

We found out later that our idea was in competition with another group who wanted to place a monument in the same location. It was the initial presentation by Mel Simpson that carried the day and gave us the rights to build our thank you to the city. He was a great salesman.

This project was made possible with the help of many people and organizations who deserve some recognition—This was a max effort and once again we achieved success. The Sixth met the challenge and performed above and beyond.

GETTING MILITARY RECORDS FOR YOURSELF OR RELATIVES

If you are interested in obtaining copies of your military service records or those of a relative, you can obtain them from the National Personnel Records Center either by using and on-line request or by writing the Center.

Veterans or next-of-kin of deceased veterans can use the online order form at vetrecs.archives.gov (or use the SF-180 Obtain and Fill out Standard Form 180 (SF-180), OR

Write a Letter to Request Records: National Personnel Records Center, 1 Archives Drive, St. Louis, Missouri 63138.

Inclue as much of the following information as possible:

- The veteran's complete name used while in service
- Service number or social security number
- Branch of service

- Dates of service
- Date and place of birth may also be helpful, especially if the service number is not known
- If the request pertains to a record that may have been involved in the 1973 fire, also include:
 - o Place of discharge
 - Last unit of assignment
 - Place of entry into the service, if known.

Please submit a separate request (either SF 180 or letter) for each individual whose records are being requested.

Please Note: Next-of-kin (the un-remarried widow or widower, son, daughter, father, mother, brother or sister of the deceased veteran) must provide proof of death of the veteran, such as a copy of the death certificate, a letter from the funeral home or a published obituary.



VETERANS' HISTORY PROJECT

The Veterans' History Project of the American Folklife Center at the Library of Congress collects, preserves, and makes accessible the personal accounts of American war veterans so that future generations may hear directly from veterans and better understand the realities of war. To participate please look at www.loc.gov and search for Veterans' History Project. The information provides how and why to participate and has all you need to know to join the project. This is a great way to remember your father, spouse, or grandparent and keep alive the memory of their experiences and sacrifices during WWII.

THE PIRATE'S LOG: first published in 1946 and often reprinted. The book follows bombing and mining missions over the Japanese Empire and the conclusion of history's greatest conflict in September 1945. With second, third and fourth generation young people continuing to show more interest in WW 2, this is a must for family members. Each copy of The Pirate's Log costs \$30.00 which includes mailing.

DVD: contains 450 photographs and runs 58 minutes. It tells the story of the 6th Bomb Group and all of the support personnel from reactivation stateside in April 1944. The DVD follows the bombing and mining missions culminating with the dropping of the Atomic bombs and the signing of the unconditional surrender of Japan on September 2, 1945. Each costs \$30.00 which includes shipping.

DETAILS OF REUNION ADVENTURES



Drop everything and call **RIGHT NOW** to reserve your hotel room for the 6th Bomb Group Reunion. You can cancel your room right up until 48 hours prior, but PLEASE call NOW. I can't emphasize this enough. It will make things so much easier on us if we have a rough idea of attendance numbers. Call the hotel: **425-423-9000**

FUTURE OF FLIGHT THURSDAY. Our first adventure outside the hotel will be to the Future of Flight Museum, which is just steps from our hotel. During your Thursday visit to the Future of Flight Museum you will board a bus for a tour of the Boeing Assembly plant which is inside the WORLD'S LARGEST building. Experience the modern marvel of commercial jet production on this one-of-a-kind tour of the Boeing assembly plant. The gift shop and revamped museum displays are great for a glimpse into aviation's future.

MUSEUM OF FLIGHT FRIDAY. On Friday, we will hop a bus to the Museum of Flight (south of Seattle). When we arrive, you'll be welcomed by well-informed docents who are prepared to provide you with an insider's glance at all the museum's amazing displays. This Museum holds one of the largest air and space collections in the US. In the Aviation Pavilion you'll discover one of your old friends: the beautifully restored B-29. It is parked between the B-17 and the B-47. You'll be able to climb aboard the West Coast's only Concord, walk the aisle of JFK's Air Force One and view the Space Shuttle mock-up which was used in astronaut training. The bus has an on-board bathroom and can accommodate wheel chairs.

FRIDAY LUNCH. We will gather for lunch in the Red Barn. This Barn is Boeing's original manufacturing building and is now designated an historic landmark. Enjoy the rustic ambiance and savor your catered luncheon while being entertained by a special guest speaker. Be sure to catch an elevator ride to the second floor of the Barn where you will discover Tinian photos and personal relics.

FLYING HERITAGE MUSEUM SATURDAY. Saturday, we will visit Microsoft co-founder, aircraft collector, and Seahawk's owner Paul Allen's very special collection of vintage war machines at the Flying Heritage and Combat Armor Museum at Paine Field. There is a recently-opened hangar that allows visitors a closer and touchable engagement with the vehicles. The collection emphasizes the European theater, but you will enjoy the walk-through time and the chance to see some familiar warfare equipment.
